INDIGENOUS LAND CONNECTIONS



Where I live is the Confederate Villages of Lisjan which is a Ohlone Muwekma tribe.

The language they speak is Chochenyo. Corrina Gould is a great example of the confederate villages of Lisjan as a spokesperson, activist, and tribal chair. In this video she speaks on her life as tribal chair and her experience.



PLANTS AND THEIR USES



The cedars of my area are a powerful medicinal treatment, their leaves are used in cough medicines and help with joint pains. They can also be used to help tuberculosis and fevers.

Another medicinal emeryville tree is the spruce which is used as an antiseptic for wounds antimicrobial against bacteria and fungi, and lozenge for a sore throat.

A Emeryville native plants called Pickleweed otherwise known as glasswort is full of vitamins that help with arthritic pains, skin and tissue repair, swelling and inflammation, and treating rheumatism.



LANDBACK

The San Francisco Chronicle's states that the Ohlone land is being taken back off of 105th Avenue, and though it isn't exactly us giving back to the Confederate Villages of Lisjan, it is still important that they are rebuilding their neighborhoods. My area has a 30% chance of having a seven foot flood in the next 7 years and is in an extreme flood area with hill roads and being on rough waters.

I get about 20 inches of rain in storms and because of living on the bay, the rain and storms are a lot worse.

My drought is 51% less extreme than most people in california and my water stress is 12%.

My fire risk is less than one percent because there are no trees and I am surrounded by water.

83° is the high heat for this area but heat is a non issue because of the winds.



EMERYVILLE MARCH 21ST CYCLONE

5 deaths were accounted for across the bay area as the 88 mph winds and heavy rain storm ripped through the bay including my area. No animals were injured.

I cannot find the exact number or estimates of property damages in emeryville but I know that when it hit san francisco and marine they estimates 21\$ million of property damages due to trees, power lines, and fires being started.









The walk score is 33, there are high scores for park accessibility, and dining and entertainment is at bay street but that is far away and there's no food or schools in my area that are walking distance. It says that my area is car dependant and has bike routes but walkers are rare.

The bike score is 64, biking is convenient and practical and most of the places in my area are reachable by bike. People can bike to the grocery store and shopping court or target but you would have to take longer routes because my area is mainly highways. I do not have a bike so I do not bike places but many people do.

My area does not have a transit score, the closest bart is MacArthur and the only bus in my area is the 29 which doesn't go to the Macarthur. Luckily there is an Emeryville run free shuttle that goes to Macarthur bart that I take, but over all the transit options are very minimal.

the people of color in my area is 49%,


28% children and seniors,

SOGOREA TE LAND TRUST

WHO IS INVOLVED?

This trust is directed by Corrina Gould and Johnella LaRose, and is sloganned as led by urban indigenous women. It is run as well by 5 board members and seventeen other contributors with different roles such as Land Team Member, Tribal Administrator, Youth Program Coordinator, Landback Coordinator, Development Director, Media Team, and Seed Rematriator.

It is designated for indigenous people and organizes why to cultivate their cultures, ideologies, and land back movements.

SOGOREA TE LAND TRUST PURPOSE

The san francisco based land trust was created for indigenous people to work to give indigenous land back to indigenous people. Through cultural revitalization, rematriation, and restoration of land, the land trust is working to heal and rebuild from colonization and genocide. They are active in Ohlone languages and tribal practices, and give indigenous people affordable housing, with land to live, work, and pray on.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS


They have created three strong programs that are working to revitalize indigenous culture, and have six land sites of land they have returned to Ohlone and Lisjan areas.

REFLECTION




