

The primary spoken language of the Muwekma Ohlone is cocenyo (chochenyo), the language of most easy bay tribes.

Plants

Black Sage

The Chumash people (San Luis Obispo to LA) used sage in tea that when rubbed onto the skin relieves pain. The leaves and stalks were also used as treatment for coughs and sore throats.





Wild Fennel

Fennel is primarily used in treating digestive issues like intestinal gas, bloating, and loss of appetite.



Pineapple Guava

Pineapple Guavas are fruits that can help with weight loss and lowering cholesterol.

The Landback Movement-"We Have a Vision"


KQED: 'We Have a Vision': East Bay Ohlone Tribe Looks to Future as Oakland Announces Landback Plan

"On Thursday, the City of Oakland announced plans to return about 5 acres of Joaquin Miller Park to the East Bay Ohlone, which would make Oakland the first California city ever to turn over part of a municipal park as part of the Indigenous Land Back movement.

If approved, the site known as Sequoia Point will be co-stewarded by the Sogorea Te' Land Trust, a women-run nonprofit, and the Confederated Villages of Lisjan, an East Bay Ohlone tribe, through the creation of a cultural conservation easement."



Environmental Vulnerability



Climate change risk in my area (via climatecheck.com)

Very High*

Flood Risk

This number means there will be 88 high tide floods by 2050 and a 6% chance for major flooding in the next 30 years.



Drought Risk

Water stress is the percentage of water used by humans. High risk is +40%, my area is at 44% and is projected to increase to 48% by 2050.



Storm Risk

My area has historically had 20.2" of rain, by 2050 its projected to increase to 20.7"

An extreme storm near me would be 48 hours with 0.7" of rainfall.

The California Wildfires

Fire season in 2019 was impactful to me mainly because of how it affected our school and social climate. I was not personal affected by the fires directly, but like everyone else I was affected by the ash and smog. Covid one year later sort of blocked this period out for me, but really, we only had a 3-4 month break from major world crises.

Deaths and Injuries: 3 killed, 22 non-fatal injuries.

Damages: over the 7,680 fires, 259,000 acres of land was burnt up.

A few nearby public transportation options.




Very Bikeable

Biking is convenient for most trips.



Transit Score




Some Transit

Accomplishments


Havdalah at West Berkeley Shellmound (ongoing)

JOOL has been going to the West Berkeley Shellmound monthly since 2021, in an ongoing effort to protest the private development of the ohlone land.

Acorn on Seder Plate

The seder is a part of the holiday passover, where we acknowledge various things via items on the seder plate. The acorn represents our duty to acknowledge our role on the land and the people who lived on it before us.

Additionally, JOOL supports indigenous rematriation by paying the Shuumi land tax each passover.



How you can work with JOOL

- Joining the Shellmound Havdalah
 Joining the protests that the JOOL organizes at the shellmound.
- Paying the Shuumi land tax
 The Shuumi land tax is an optional annual tax you can pay that supports the Sogorea te land trust.

A drash is the teaching of torah, typically in a synagogue. JOOL has taken this practice and now has a blog where people share drash, express opinions and thoughts in a safe space dedicated to knowledge.

My Takeaway


