
# Black Women an Reproductive Injustice

Claim: Today, Black women nationally are at risk for unplanned pregnancy as they use less effective forms of birth control. This is an issue that is directly linked to the medical community's history of racist treatment of Black people and their reproductive rights. This racism continues today.

### **Racist Reproductive History**

- Present day legacy of medical mistrust
  - Medical Distrust Data
- Racist idea that Black women should not reproduce in order to decrease the Black population
- Many women of color were thus targeted by encroachments on reproductive rights
  - Mississippi Apendectomies
  - Norplant

Black Women are 3x as more likely than Whi Women to experience an unintended pregna

As of 2002, 15% of Black Women at risk of unintended pregnancy were not practicing contraception.

Women of Color are less likely to use a long acting reversible contraceptive (LARC) than their white female counterparts.

### Why do these disparities exist?

- ▷ Research study on discrimination and contraception

- Perceived pressure due to Medical Distrust
- Difficult situation to solve
